

The Summer Work

The editing of The Chosen People after the suspension for the summer is somewhat difficult as to choice of material. News items of the local mission work, its workers and its immediate field of labor, and our extension work which reaches far beyond, have accumulated so that they greatly exceed the scope of this little magazine. One therefore finds it hard to know just what part of the news to write first so as to meet satisfactorily the interest of most of our friends. However, the difficulty eases with the knowledge that we all are co-workers together with the Lord Jesus Christ and in this way our united interests center in the one essential point, viz., the glorification of the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Let me therefore report to you first of all that the name of the Lord Jesus Christ has been proclaimed from the platform of Beth Sar Shalom throughout the summer, at the usual hours for Gospel services, without any cessation. Special meetings also were held twice a day during the solemn Jewish New Year and Day of Atonement festivals which were celebrated September 7th, 8th and 16th. The earnestness of the Jews evidenced in their rapt attention to the preaching of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ at all times, cannot be described by mere words. One must witness it with his own eyes in order to have an adequate idea of the serious thoughts taking hold of the minds of those Jews who listened to the preaching of the Cross.

Visiting the Sick and the Poor

The house to house visitation by our workers has been carried on faithfully and efficiently. While some of the workers have had the privilege of proclaiming the Lord Jesus Christ in public from the platform, others have been richly blessed in magnifying that same Name in the homes of the families they visited. You will read their several reports in other columns with great interest and gratitude to God for having blessed your endeavors through your representatives engaged in this mission to the honor and glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our workers always find some Jews who open their ears and hearts to receive the simple story of the birth, crucifixion and resurrection of their Messiah, Who is the Saviour of all mankind. While Zionism is getting stronger almost daily, growing in power and influence and enlisting many Jews

of means and importance in its cause and while those imbued with that ideal become so elated as to scorn the offer of free salvation in Christ, yet there are many Jews who do not seem to be taken with that movement. They have a longing after God and are not satisfied with Zionism. Therefore, when these Jews, who are like sheep without a shepherd, hear of the love of God in the Lord Jesus Christ Who is still willing to embrace them with outstretched arms and save them from all their sins and troubles, they are quick enough to understand and discern the truth as it is in Jesus from the emptiness and godlessness of the Zionists. In preaching to the Jews we frequently allude to Zionism as being the means through which God will work out His plan of bringing the unbelieving Jews back to Jerusalem for the purpose of refining them through the fire. Zech. 13: 9. Thus those Jews who have some understanding of the truth do not feel at home in any place other than Beth Sar Shalom.

The Lord also recompensed us for the loss of a number of our workers who were drafted into the army during the summer by sending two new workers, Mrs. Randolph and Miss Christensen, led, we believe, by the Holy Ghost to take up this branch of the service.

The Winona Lake Conference

A large number of our friends have indicated their deep interest in the Winona Conference which was held this summer for the second time. As announced in the May number of The Chosen People, our conference lasted for three days, and was full of deep interest and great blessing. (You remember last fall we reported to you the proceedings of the conference and its results both spiritually and financially, for which you were thankful to God our Heavenly Father and praised and blessed Him for His working power in our midst.) This year we had larger audiences at the Conference and deeper appreciation and more remarkable results than before. The audiences greatly enjoyed Dr. Buswell's lectures on Revelation, Dr. Van Osdel's talks on Daniel and the Devotional Hours with Brother Irving. A number of people were overheard to say on leaving the hall at the close of some of our meetings that they had learned more Christianity at this Conference than they had known all their lives. In this way surely the name of the Lord Jesus Christ was glorified in that conference. Sunday evening at 6:30, there was an open air meeting which was addressed by Mr. Cohn, and a free-will offering of about \$500.00 was given, which more than covered our expenses. One of the most interesting meetings was when ten Jewish Christians gave short talks relating how they came to accept the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour. Especially did the testimony of Mrs. Bernheim go home to the very hearts of the people. Tears were trickling down many faces. God willing, we will from month to month publish in The Chosen People some of these conference addresses. One, by Mr. Irving, will be found in this number.

I cannot close without a word of deepest appreciation to you all for the remarkable way in which you have kept up your financial support of the work during the entire summer. When we consider the stress of the days in which we live, your generosity has been none other than miraculous, to be explained only by the fact that a miracle-working God has enabled you to remember the work among His own people. May our close union in this common task to which he has called us all, continue always, and may we always be found worthy of your confidence and friendship.

EDITORIAL

God's Key Turns the Lock. The many events that have rapidly followed one another as a result of this war may be fitly compared to things which have been hidden and are now revealed by opening a door and letting in the light. Yet no human skill or ingenuity could ever have accomplished these acts. God has, so to speak, turned the key with which He has been opening and will yet open locks that have concealed to the human mind the things which have been spoken by God through His servants, the prophets. There have been in every generation those who denied the possibility of the Jews ever coming back into possession of their Promised Land. There are still those who spiritualize God's promise of restoring Israel to their country and apply it to the Church. Thus God's Word of bringing back His people to the land has been, as it were, under a lock, obscure; but one turn of His key of power caused Great Britain to take Jerusalem from the hands of the Turks and to promise it to the Jews. Again, the Jews have been for the last 2,000 years out of world politics. They have been entirely wiped off the map of the nations; they have had no home, no flag, no national emblem, and no name. Suddenly, over night, as it were, while the Jews were asleep, God's key of power was turning, and lo and behold in the morning the Jews woke up with their country within grasp, with a national emblem floating in all the Jewish quarters and with a Government administration in Jerusalem consisting exclusively of Jewish statesmen. Yet the greatest and most powerful kingdom on earth, Great Britain, has called out the Tews as a nation to join the league of nations against the foe of humanity. The Jews now have Palestine for their homeland, a national bank, a national flag, a national university (in building) and a national standing army of over 10,000 volunteer soldiers fighting for the entire liberation of their fatherland. storation of the Jews. It seems to be somewhat similar to Jere. 25: 15-30, where God spoke of causing the nations to take the wine cup of His fury and then sending the sword among them. But, as we said before, these fulfillments are only partial, for this key of God is going to keep on turning and turning until all the springs of the lock are opened. God has the one main purpose in view, viz., the acceptance of Christ by the Jews. He has been waiting for the followers of Christ to accomplish this God-desired missionary work, "and He saw that there was no man and no intercessor, therefore His arm brought salvation unto Him." Isa. 59: 16. Again in Isa. 51: 18-22 we read that God complains that "there is none to guide her, neither is there any that taketh her by the hand . . thus saith thy Lord that pleadeth the cause of His people, Behold, I have taken out of thine hand the cup of trembling, even the dregs of the cup of my fury; but I will put it into the hand of them that afflict thee, etc." Hence the fury of God upon all the nations who have ignored the opportunity of witnessing for Christ and giving His gospel message to the Jews. He is now Himself beginning to bring about the conversion of the Jews as a nation.

The first step is to bring them back to their land and restore unto them a nationality and then in that Promised Land He will bring them through the fire, the time of Jacob's trouble. Zech. 13: 8, Jere. 30: 7. Then they will be led to accept the Lord Iesus as their Saviour. They must be brought into their land because in their land they rejected Him. They must be restored as a nation because as a nation they rejected Him, and as a nation they must accept Him.

Now seeing these wonderful facts that have been here pointed out, as well as many other partial fulfillments of prophecy which space forbids us to record, will people be instructed and believe in the Word of God? Will

God's plan and purpose for the re- every follower of Christ endeavor to become a co-worker with God in the work of evangelizing the Jews? Will people believe that what God says He means? Will they remember that when the Holy Spirit says "To the Jew First" it means that way precisely? "Afterward (after the great tribulation) shall the children of Israel return and seek the Lord their God and David their King (the Lord Jesus). Again "But they shall serve the Lord their God and David their King." Jere. 30: 9. And again, "I will set up one shepherd over them, even my servant David, a Prince among them, I the Lord have spoken." Ezek. 34: 23, 24. This is the last turn of God's key in the lock. Whether you believe it or not, whether you co-work with God to convert the Jews or not and whether you believe in the literal kingdom of Christ over the Jews and over all the world or not, it will come to pass as surely as you live. It only requires a few more turns of God's key and the Jews will be restored to their promised land. They will go through the tribulation, they will cry out to God to send them the Messiah Jesus. He then will come and they will accept Him and He will reign over them, and then the true followers of the Lord Jesus will reign with Him forever.

INCIDENTS IN THE WORK

Now that the summer is over, we look back with hearts of thanksgiving upon the manifold blessings our dear Lord and Saviour has bestowed upon us in our labors throughout the season. Even on the hottest days, we were privileged by His grace, to keep our doors wide open, and at every Friday and Sunday meeting, visitors flocked in to hear of the blessed salvation in Christ Jesus, and we gained several inquirers and a few converts.

We were also visited by some of our drafted converts from near and from far: one came from Texas, and how joyful we were together, being permitted to meet again in the presence of Him who said, "I will be with thee always."

And now something about those outside the fold:-One Sunday morning I went on a train to a church located on the border of the city. My coach contained many Jewish passengers going to Coney Island for enjoyment. Among them I saw some who had attended our meetings. A Jew next to me noticed me reading a tract, and looked over my shoulder to see what I was reading, and immediately a conversation began, which soon attracted others nearby. One of the listeners jumped up in excitement and asked, "Were you in our house in Myrtle Avenue, and did you urge my mother to come to your mission?" Before giving me a chance to answer, he continued, "Let me tell you, that you are a lucky man that I was not at home at that time." "If you had been home," I replied, "you possibly would be the lucky man.' "In what way?" he asked. "You would have heard of the salvation and happiness to be found in the Messiah; you would grasp it and believe it; you wouldn't need Coney Island for enjoyment-you would have it right in your heart." Some began to threaten violence, but helped me to keep them listening respectfully, while speaking of God's plan in Christ Jesus. One Jew asked, "If Jesus was the true Messiah, how could He be killed? Should not the Messiah bring us Jews to Palestine and be our King." This gave me a splendid opportunity to speak of the two comings of Christ, based on Old Testament Scriptures. Another one remarked, "If I dared to come near your Mission I would have glorious (?) enjoyment when my parents at home learned of it. Recently as I was leading the mothers' meeting, a young woman, about twenty years of age, came in with one of the mothers. That afternoon I spoke on John 14, and as the Spirit helped me to unfold the Word, the tears ran down her cheeks. After the meeting I spoke to her and she told me she had come from Russia three years ago, where she had been brought up ignorantly and without any knowledge of religious teachings. She had lost her position through an immoral boss, because she wanted to live a pure life, and she had difficulty in obtaining work because of her ignorance. That night she had intended to end her life, for she showed me the poison she had in her pocket, but praise the Lord she was led here. The following morning she came to the Mission, and Brother Englander and I talked and prayed with her. I am teaching her to read and write, and she says she loves Jesus. We are praying for her and trying to patiently lead her in the way of life.

Visiting in one of the city hospitals. I had to obtain a pass from the head physician in order to see a patient outside of visiting hours. This physician is a very learned and well-known Iew. Dr. P .- He asked me what Mission I came from and what we taught. I told him of the rejection of the Jews by their Messiah. He answered they had expected a great king. I told him they forget that every king had to be born and have a childhood and he seemed amazed to think that the Jews had not considered that side of the question. One night, several years ago, the Rev. Leopold Cohn spoke at the church I attended, and there he told of the great work of bringing the Gospel to the Jew. I was much interested, although only a child, at that time, and was especially touched by a few kind words said to me personally. The experience of that evening made a lasting impression upon me.

Recently, when in need of advice concerning a dear Jewish girl friend

(for whom I have the great hope that she will some day know Jesus as her Messiah and for whom I ask your prayers), I came to the Williamsburg Mission to the Jews. The very help I needed, the old Testament proof of Jesus' Messiahship, was readily and most kindly given me. Besides this. I was surprised and honored by being asked to become one of the workers of the Mission, the very same one of which I had heard when a child.

At first the work, being so new to me, was hard. There were times, when I was giving out tracts earnestly, that the heated refusals of some Tews and the insults of others among them. would hurt; but there were also the heart-warming instances when Jewish men and women would not only accept, but (as they walked) read with evident interest the tracts given them.

That was at first. Now I have been in the mission work two months and have (beside other work of the mission) distributed over 1,000 tracts.

Here is one of my recent experiences in tract distribution: On B-St., I passed a small, but scrupulously neat candy store, behind the counter of which I could see a middle-aged Jew. Upon my offering him a tract he refused it in strong terms; but when I started out again from the Mission later in the afternoon, I took with me, beside the tracts, two booklets. They were, "What is His Son's Name?" and "To Both the Houses of Israel." I felt impelled to bring these booklets to that storekeeper, though he had told me that he would never read any Hebrew Christian literature. I prayed earnestly that God would help me in this matter, for the man was refined and intelligent, in spite of his mistaken antagonism to this work; therefore he might see the truth in these fine booklets. Straight to the little store I went again, talked with the man for a few minutes, and then my heart was very grateful to my loving Heavenly Father, for the man not only took both books, but promised to study them thoughtfully that evening. The man's wife asked for the tracts which her husband had at first refused, and both she and her husband spoke most kindly to me, which seemed wonderful after the hostile reception I received when first I offered the tract.

This is but one of the very many encouraging incidents that I have witnessed in this work for God.

THE JEW-THE PREDICTED RESTORATION FULFILLED

Winona Conference Address (Condensed)

By Rev. C. H. Irving

So far as we are able to judge by all the facts available, there never was a period in the history of the Jewish people when their affairs were so widely and intelligently discussed by Gentiles, as at the present moment. The whole question pertaining to the Iew has been surrounded with perplexing and even vexing problems. It has annoyed kings, emperors and statesmen for four milleniums. This wonderful people, with four thousand years of unbroken history, with a book of unimpeachable authority and with a promised land, the battle ground of the ages-the Jews demand our careful and reverent study.

If theologians and statesmen had carefully studied the Book they would not have made the gross blunders they did in the past. The Book makes the blood-stained way of the Jew clear. History will not help in the solution of the problem, philosophy will give no light on it, but the Book will.

A Land Promised

We are familiar with the call of Abraham and the covenant made with him and a land bestowed upon him and his posterity. When that covenant was signed and sealed the chief actor was God Himself. (Gen. 15: 12). It was then that God Himself passed between the tokens of the treaty and thus took upon Himself the responsibility of carrying out its provisions, which were, a great nation, a great land and absolute ownership and full possession of that land.

The territory was to comprise that vast district between the land of Egypt on the southwest to the Euphrates on the northeast. Because of their timidity, shortened vision and unbelief, the Jews never held all of this

occupancy. Two dispossessions and restorations have been accomplished, and a third is mentioned, which the Jew is now undergoing. That he will return to the Land of the Fathers there is no question so far as the voice of inspiration is concerned. Read carefully Jer. 23: 3-8.

So much for the fact of their return. Their weary, restless feet will make the final journey to the Promised Land. The sad fact, however, is that the Jew goes back with a heart alienated againt his God. The fulness of the Gentiles is just being completed. While wandering as exiles outside of the Land, God said that for their disobedience and unbelief dire punishment should fall upon them. (See Deut. 28: 59-68.)

But God's eve is on the scattered people: He says "that the Lord thy God shall turn thy captivity and have compassion on thee and will return and gather thee from all the nations. If any of thine be driven to the uppermost part of heaven, from thence will the Lord thy God gather thee, and from thence He will fetch thee." "And the Lord thy God will bring thee into the land which thy father possessed and thou shalt possess it!"

The Land Under a Protector

The country itself is under the protection of Jehovah. It occupies a strategic position. It is a highway for the nations—a bridge between east and west. It has been a region of remarkable fertility. God bestowed wonderful material favors on the country-but when the Jew went out. the disfavor of the Almighty rested like a pall of death on its hilltops, fertile plains and rich valleys. Death and desolation reigned. But this was God's Promised Land "a land which the Lord thy God careth for." "The eyes of the Lord are always upon it from the beginning of the year even unto the end of it." The Jews polterritory. It yet remains for their luted their inheritance-defiled it with unspeakable abominations, and hence they became incorrigible, obstinate, determinedly self-willed.

Returning in Unbelief

For two thousand years the Jews nationally have persisted in a determined rejection of Jesus as the Messiah. Only in individual cases have they consented to examine the evidence that would convince the fairminded. That which national Israel was in pursuit of they have not obtained. They have become hardened. God hath given them a spirit of drowsiness-eyes to see nothing with, ears to hear nothing with, even until now, therefore partial blindness hath fallen upon Israel, until the times of the Gentiles have come in. (Read Ez. 36: 24-28: Ez. 39: 25-29.

It is evident from these passages that Israel will return to Palestine in unbelief, and afterward a great spiritual awakening will occur. However, between the restoration and the great national blessings so much insisted upon, there will be that appalling period known as "the time of Jacob's trouble." But that is another question, not to be discussed at this time. I will simply say that God's severest chastisement will fall upon the Jew in his own land of Palestine and in the future. We must now look for the

Signs of the Return

Are the people of the wandering feet returning home? If so, what are the signs? First observe the rise of the movement called "Zionism." In August, 1897, in the city of Basle, the first congress was held in which the Zionist program was arranged. This congress was a remarkable gathering of several hundred Jews, all enthusiastic for the national idea.

Today every civilized nation, including Russia, is committed to the plan. Germany is not in favor of it, nor is Turkey, and the German government has been urged by some of its statesmen to oppose what they consider the Zionism of Britain.

On November 2nd, 1917, a memorable day in Jewish history, Alfred J. Balfour, the British foreign secretary, outlined the British policy regarding the future Palestine. On December 2nd, 1917, the British Jews held a great thanksgiving meeting in the London Opera House, which was unable to contain the throngs seeking admission. Similar meetings were held in America and all over the Jewish world.

On December 9th, a message was received from General Allenby, the British commander, that Jerusalem had surrendered and had been freed from Turkish bondage. God could not have arranged a more apt day for the present fall of Jerusalem. It occurred on the Hebrew date of the 25th of Kislev, which is the anniversary of the day when Judas Maccabeus conquered and purged the temple of Greek idolatry—the first of an eight day festival which has been observed by the Jews ever since.

This summer a most important gathering of representative Jews of America was held in Pittsburgh. The reports of this gathering are deeply significant from the prophetic standpoint, and indicate great progress in the development of Israel's plan for the rejuvenation of Palestine. All the various Jewish societies of America, which have been more or less disjointed in their relations, were merged into one great body known as the "Zionist Organization of America."

The country has been divided into districts, which will have proportional representation in a great council of fifty members, which will meet frequently in New York City to further the plans of Zionism. The constitution for the Jewish Republic in Palestine was adopted with great enthusiasm. It embodied the principles of public ownership of all land and facilities together with religious liberty and free education.

The first tax for the support of the national government has been levied. One wonders what further step is needed to fully establish the fact that at last Israel is a nation again fulfilling the ancient prophecy and pointing all Bible students to the later words of our Lord regarding the budding fig tree. . . "Ye know that summer is near." "Even so, come Lord Jesus, come quickly."

General Information

The Williamsburg Mission to the Jews is a missionary society incorporated under the laws of the State of New York to promulgate the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ among the Iews of New York and the United States. It was started in 1894, by Leopold Cohn, in obedience to the call of God. With no friends to back him, he placed reliance on the Lord, Who through His children, has sent the necessary funds. Although our activities have steadily grown until at present our needs are about \$35,000 annually, the Lord has always supplied them.

Meetings are held for adults, and for children. A Medical Department is maintained to assist the poor Jews. The Poor Fund enables us to relieve the distress of deserving Jews and to give a practical demonstration of Christian love. The Literature Fund is used to purchase Hebrew Bibles and Testaments and to print tracts in Jewish. Mr. Cohn has written seven Iewish tracts himself which have been used of God to the conversion of many. A complete schedule of all the varied activities of the Mission, of which the foregoing is but suggestive, will be found on page 2.

JEWISH NOTES

The Jews in their daily prayers have a section which is called "The Eighteen Silent Blessings." While repeating these in an inaudible voice they stand with their faces toward the East. in accordance with I Kings 8: 44. "Pray unto the Lord toward the City and toward the house which I have built for thy name". Now the latest steps in the development of creating in Palestine the new Jewish State indicate that the Jewish sun is gradually rising in the East. Toward the end of last July, Dr. Weitzman, the head of the Jewish administration in Jerusalem, laid the cornerstones of the Jewish University. There were twelve stones symbolizing the twelve tribes. A large number of the leading Zionists have been dreaming for years and years of the founding of the Jewish University and at last they are going to realize one of their fondest hopes. It is expected by them that this University will be the means of nurturing Jewish learning. They consider the University more needed and useful than the Temple. They have succeeded to a greater extent than they ever hoped in the way of negotiations with the Powers and with preparations for the agricultural, commercial and industrial developments of the Jewish homeland; and now they are looking forward to the time when this Jewish University will fulfill the needs of education. Thus, Zionism is flying with two wings, on one side commerce and politics, and on the other, education and culture.

Dr. Weitzman has also succeeded in gaining the confidence of the Mohammedans of Palestine. Upon one occasion he made a present of an old copy of the Koran to the head of the Mohammedan religion. This made a very good impression upon all the Mohammedans. Through this and similar tactics and practices of diplomacy that remarkable Jewish leader is expected to create a harmonious and pleasant relationship between the Arabs and the Jews.

Mr. Arthur James Balfour, Minister of Foreign Affairs for England, who made the declaration concerning the rehabilitation of Palestine for the Jews, sent his congratulations to the Zionist commission in Palestine upon the laying of the foundation stones for the Jewish university. In the same message he said that he regarded the Jewish university as an important contribution to the progress of the

The courts in Jerusalem which have been organized by the English government are working in harmony with the Jewish code of laws. Decisions have been rendered in accordance with the Talmudic laws. Especially is this true in the matter of inheritances. It has also been reported that since the Turkish grip upon Jerusalem has been removed, the unsanitary conditions have been changed, and consequently the usual maladies, as typhus and cholera, that used to be very common there, have almost entirely disappeared.

The British government has officially recognized the Jews as a nation by asking them through the Central Zionist Bureau at Copenhagen, to join the league of nations, the draft of which is in process of being prepared by a Council appointed for that purpose. It seems that the English government has been commissioned, in the providence of God, to take the first step toward making the Jews a nation by declaring Palestine their homeland and by inviting them to join the league of nations.

Mr. Balfour celebrated his 70th birthday last August. This opportunity was seized upon by all the world Zionistic organizations who delegated the well-known Jewish literatus, Mr. Sokolov, as their representative to congratulate him. To this the aged statesman made a very warm reply, uttering in strong language a few sentences which assured the Zionists of his continued good-will to carry on all the enterprises in the interests of the noble task which he had begun.

getting into bankruptcy in their re-It has been both amusing and interformation. The Jewish Legion in the English army now numbers above 10,000.

Jews have enlisted readily, leaving, in many cases, wives and children, counting it a great privilege to enroll in a Tewish army and go to Jerusalem and fight the Turk so as to prepare a home for their Jewish nation.

Owing to the terrible persecution of the Jews in Roumania, Austria and Russia, where many hundreds of thousands have been robbed, murdered and banished, and also on account of so many Jewish soldiers having been killed and wounded in the war, the Iews have been grieving deeply, especially at the time of their New Year and Day of Atonement holidays. Never before have there been such large multitudes of Jews visiting the graves of their parents, the great rabbis, and pious relatives, as this season, especially during the days between September 6th and 17th. Jewish tradition has it that the dead are pleased to have their loved ones visit their graves. In the Talmud, Sotah 34 b. we are told that Caleb, who was commissioned by Moses together with Joshua and the other ten spies, (Numbers 13) stopped at the graves of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob which are found in Hebron and prayed that they would intercede for him to be granted spiritual strength not to fall in line with the counsel of the wicked spies to bring an evil report. Again we find another passage in the Talmud, Tanis, 16 a, saying that the reason for visiting the graves of our dead is that they should invoke God's mercy upon us.

esting to read the protests of Reformed rabbis to the President of the United States of America referring to Mr. Wilson's letter to Rabbi Wise, of New York, which reads in part as follows: "I have watched with deep and sincere interest the reconstructive work which the Weitzman commission has done in Palestine at the instance of the British government and I welcome an opportunity to express the satisfaction I have felt in the progress of the Zionist movement in the United States. . . I think that all Americans will be deeply moved by the report that even in these times of stress the Weitzman commission has been able to lay the foundation of the Hebrew University at Jerusalem." This letter was published in the Zionist papers and read in the synagogues during the New Year holidays and taken as an endorsement by the President, of the British position toward the Iews. While the Zionists were greatly encouraged with the President's message, the Reformed rabbis have been hard hit by it. They, like the Reformed rabbis of England, are bitterly opposed to Zionism. When this message was published they wrote a letter to President Wilson asking him to reconsider his approval of the Zionist activities on the ground that Zionism will detract from the loyalty of citizenship on the part of the Jews. The Reformed Jews have long ago cut out from the Jewish prayer book all references to Jerusalem and the Messiah. Now that the Tewish rehabilitation is approaching its goal they are alarmed at the prospect of
