Incidents in the Work.

CONVERSION OF AN EDUCATED JEW.

A Jewish brother, a dealer in real estate, who has been in America since he was a child, and who speaks good English, asked us the following

QUESTION.

"What fault," said he, "did you find in the Jewish religion? What led you to change your faith and accept one of the other nations around us? Did not God say 'Ye shall not walk in their statutes?' We see and know you are a man of great knowledge, and I need not tell you it is written so-and-so, because you know it all. Well, now, please tell me what led you to take this step. I do not wonder at an ignorant Jew becoming a Christian, but when a friend of mine told me about you, the other day, (here he used flattering words, which modesty forbids us to quote) I could not rest, my sorrow was so great over the step you had taken, so I resolved to come and see you and ask for an explanation."

THE ANSWER.

We replied: "we found no fault in our Jewish religion, because the Jews have no religion at all. Religion in Latin is 'Religo,' to reunite. After the fall of man, the gracious promise was given of the Deliverer of men. In the beginning of the Bible it is written of Christ that He shall do the will of God and reunite or reconcile man with God.

Before the fullness of time, God gave a temporary remedy by ordering our Jewish fathers to bring a sin offering in case of sin. Now we Jews have no more altar, high-priest, or sacrifice. How, then, can we obtain pardon for our sins?

IS IT NOT WRITTEN

'It is the blood that maketh atonement for the soul?' Now, how can you say you have a religion since you have nothing to reunite your spotted soul to the Holy God? Therefore, I beseech you, accept the Lord Jesus Christ, for this is the only true religion in the world."

HE BECOMES CHANGED.

The gentleman was not only changed in mind, but also in his face, for he became pale, and then as white as the snow. He said nothing further at that time, but on another occasion he told us that the explanation impressed him so strongly that he commenced at once to read the New Testament. The thought that he had no religion was an awful fear to him and started him to

thinking very seriously. He now believes that Jesus, our Lord, is the Sand promised of God from the beginning.

A PROFITABLE VISIT.

A young man invited us to visit his home. we found him living with his wife in a few, very neat, clean rooms. He had frequently visited our meetings with his wife, and they were earnestly seeking after more light in regard to the religion of Jesus Christ while in conversation with them.

WE WERE SUDDENLY INTERRUPTED.

It seems as we were talking with them, the man who occupies the apartments in the front of them had been listening very attentively in his rooms to our conversation. He became so intensely interested that, unable to constrain his feelings, he

SUDDENLY OPENED THE DOOR and exclaimed, "I have been listening and heard all your talk. I am very glad to have a chance to see you. I have been to your hall in Ewen street, but that Irish policeman outside the door would not let me in because I was late. What made me anxious to hear you was this:

WHAT THE RABBI SAID.

One Sabbath, some weeks ago, our Rabbi gave out a fast for the Jews. They were to fast one day and then pray God earnestly that he should kill immediately that

MISSIONARY COHN, because he draws after him our whole community, to teach them to worship that

CRUCIFIED ONE.

And so I thought I would like to see and hear what you teach. I do not understand what it all means about the crucified one. I went to my Rabbi and asked him, 'What does the missionary teach, and how does he draw men?'

THE RABBI

refused to speak or enlighten me in any way upon the subject, simply saying that it was a sin to repeat all these things. Now tell me, please, what do you teach?"

THE EXPLANATION.

We explained briefly the story of the cross, quoting the words "And I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto me," thus showing, that only Jesus can draw men, and that it is He who draws the Jews in. We then gave him a New Testament and urged him to take it home and study it, and then he would learn of the Lord Jesus.

Sufferings of a Jewish Convert.

A Jewish brother, who was convinced of the truth as is in Jesus, our Lord, used to attend our meetings in Brownsville. His wife was so bitterly opposed to it that she commenced to persecute him, even going so far as to drag him out of one of the meetings by the ears.

HE LEAVES HIS HOUSE.

Things became so unpleasant for him at his house that at her own request he left her (however, with the understanding that when he was willing to give up Christ, he could come back to her). It was hard, poor man, for him to leave his house, but still harder to part from his 6 year old child, whom he dearly loved.

THE WIFE RELENTS.

Soon after leaving home, the heart of his wife became greatly troubled, and she got no rest until she sought him out and begged him to come back, promising him never to meddle with him in his convictions.

MORE PERSECUTION.

Just as soon as his friends heard that he had become a Christian, they had him discharged from the position he held, and refused to have any further dealings with him whatever.

Then, in order to keep from starving, he was obliged to sell nearly all his furniture and move to New York. Being a stranger there, he found it impossible to get work.

HE MAKES ANOTHER START.

Finally, he managed to get some merchandise to the value of about \$5, and started to peddle. He stationed himself on Hester street, N. Y., where thousands of Jews congregate daily and share dealings with one another.

MORE TROUBLE.

But just as every thing began to look a little brighter, he found himself suddenly confronted by his wife's brother, who, as soon as he saw him, shouted at the top of his voice,

THIS IS AN APOSTATE, KEEP AWAY FROM HIM.

This gathered a great crowd, and again the brother-in-law shouted, "This fellow has a cross on his arm; he got apostatized by a missionary in Brownsville, Brooklyn." (There is a strange belief among the Jews that when one of their number becomes converted; the Christians immediately stamp upon the arm of the convert a cross with a red hot instrument.

THEY WANT TO EXAMINE HIM.

Then the angry crowd started in to examine him and see if they could find the cross. At that moment, had not a policeman appeared, the poor fellow would have been torn into pieces.

HE GOES TO PRISON.

In some way, however, they found out he had no license, and immediately they had

him arrested, and he was sent to prison on this charge.

HE PREACHES CHRIST.

Under all these trying circumstances, and while in the jail, he met another Jew, and immediately commenced to tell him the story of the cross, and the man listened and believed.

THE BROTHER-IN-LAW.

Would we not be led to think that a brother's love for his own sister would have prevented him from causing this poor fellow all the trouble he did? But no, so intense is the hatred toward those who forsake their religion that all family ties and interests are forgotten, no matter how much others may have to suffer, the one thought uppermost in their mind is, "How can we make them suffer for what they have done?" Every kind of persecution that can be thought of is brought to bear upon them in order to get them back to the religion of their fathers; and for a Jew to become a Christian and attempt to live among his people and have dealings with them, is something that is next to an utter impossibility.

We feel that no one can read this touching experience without fully realizing what it costs a Jew to be a Christian, we, as Christians, sometimes feel that we have to give up a great deal for Christ, but have any of us ever been obliged to leave home, wife, mother and children. Have we suffered abuse, insult, and imprisonment for Him who loved us so that he lay down his life for Even under such trying circumstances, as those of our dear Jewish brother, would we preach Jesus Christ. Do you not feel that these dear people need your help, your love and your encouragement? There are many other cases like this. Day by day the Chosen People of God are coming into the light of the Gospel, and when they see Christ in all his beauty, they are willing to give up everything, and take up their cross and follow after Him. Are you willing to do all this? Then help us by your prayers and loving words of encouragement.

Two Zewish Witnesses for Christ.

On a Saturday evening at the close of the preaching service we had two Jewish brethren rise and give their testimony for Christ. They each spoke for about ten minutes, and told those present how they had been persecuted for the sake of Jesus Christ.

WHAT THEY ARE WILLING TO SUFFER.

They said: "We are not only willing to

suffer temperal loss for Christ, but if necessary we will give up our lives because we know Jesus to be the true Messiah of whom the Prophets did write, and they urged the large audience present to accept the teaching of Mr. Cohn, who had found the truth and wanted to bring his people into the light of the Gospel."

AN APPEAL TO THE AUDIENCE.

We then appealed to the audience quoting from the words found in Deuteronomy, 19th Chapter and the 15th Verse. "That at the mouth of two or three witnesses shall the matter be established." If you hesitate, we said, as many of you do, to accept our Christian exposition of the Scripture because you imbibed from your earliest youth the explanation of your commentator "Rashee," who made those passages which positively refer to the Lord Jesus as the true Messiah of none effect, then you cannot be indifferent to the power of salvation as is in Christ Jesus, of which these two brethern have testified, for two reasons. First, because it is written so in your own Holy Scripture (in the words which have just been quoted) in which "Rashee" and all the commentators agree; and secondly, because it is according to law all over the world, that the testimony of two witnesses is sufficient to establish any fact. DEEPLY IMPRESSED.

Many present were strongly impressed by the simple testimony of these two brethern, while a few others having a "Zeal of God, but not according to knowledge," were a little excited and provoked.

MY ATTENTION IS ATTRACTED.

While giving out the bibles and tracts at the close of the service to those who desired them, my attention was attracted to several men at the platform, they were asking in rather an excited manner questions of my two brethern, who had testified I then immediately took them by the hand and led them from the room followed by a few of the excited men, who dispersed as soon as we put them on the car. How true it is, that while God through Jesus Christ his Son, gave peace to these two brethern, Satan gave no rest to his adherents.

A zew's Love for His Children.

Some twelve years ago there came to this country a Jew who had always tried to live

up to the teachings of his fathers.

Shortly after his arrival he commenced to live a very sinful life, and eventually became an infidel, frequent quarrels with his wife led him to leave her and his children for several weeks at a time.

HE CAME TO HIMSELF.

Some time ago he requested me to call at his house, I did as he wished and while in his presence he related to me the following

story.

He said, "I did not want to see my children grow up and follow in the foot-steps of their father. I wanted to train them in a religious way, but how could I do so when I myself was not religious, I then thought, he said that I would find some religious gathering where I could send them, and so I commenced to inquire among the Jews where I could go and be convinced of the truth.

DIRECTED TO OUR MISSION.

Some one then told me of your Mission in Ewen Street, Williamsburg, and I commenced to attend the services, after several visits I was firmly convinced that Jesus Christ was the true Messiah, and without Him there is no truth in the Bible."

HE ASKS A QUESTION.

Before leaving, he asked me what he should do to come out more fully for Christ. I then gave him a Bible, prayed with him, and urged him to read it to his family every night, at the same time seeking divine guidance from the Holy Spirit.

TO BE BAPTISED.

In a short time he is to be baptized into the faith of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, how strange and yet how true. He started out to seek a religion for his children and in so doing, he himself found Christ.

The Was Convinced.

A Jewish brother, whom I have known for over a year, and who has attended a number of the services at the Brownsville Mission, said to me, "That the proofs given him in the meetings regarding Jesus Christ as the true Messiah, were so strong that he was now convinced of the truth."

PONDERED OVER IT.

He said, "After the meetings I would go to my home, and ponder over what you had said all through the week, still I could not get rid of my doubts and fears, and there was a constant conflict going on within."

THE LIGHT BREAKS IN.

But said he, "When Jesus, came into my mind, all my doubts disappeared, for he drove them all away." Just as the morning sun chases away the darkness from the face of the earth slowly, almost imperceptibly, yet surely, until every nook and corner is flooded with light, so is the light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ dawning on these people.

A Discouragement.

On Friday morning, Jan. 8th, there appeared in the New York World, an account of a disturbance on a Wednesday evening in our mission in Ewen street, Williamsburg. It said in substance that a gang of rowdys had broken the windows, smashed the doors, and acted altogether in a very disorderly manner; that Mr. Cohn had been to the station-house and made a complaint, but that no arrests had been made.

NO TRUTH IN IT.

If any such disturbance occurred we failed to see any thing of it. The meeting held on the evening mentioned in the World, was an unusually quiet one, and no disturbance worthy of mention occurred. The Jews in the vicinity who attend these services, feel very indignant over this matter. On the Friday evening of the day in which the article was published, many of them brought papers and called my attention to it. They said "We are not

WILD AFRICANS OR INDIANS, we are God's Chosen People, and do not break windows and smash doors. You have injured our reputations."

A VISIT TO THE STATION-HOUSE.

On the following day, accompanied by several of my Jewish brethren, I went to the Stagg street station-house, and in their presence asked the captain if I had ever been there and made any such complaint. His reply was "No, sir. You, nor any one else has been here to make any charge whatever. It is a great mistake. You had better go to the World office and find out about it." Of course, those who were with me were convinced of the fact that no such charges had been made, and immediately went and told their brethren about it.

STILL IN DOUBT.

But many of them still doubted, saying that those who had gone with me had been bribed to say what they did. Thus, it goes to show how Satan is trying to overthrow the effects which are being put forth to bring to God's Chosen People the glad tidings of salvation, and of the many discouragements we have to contend with. We feel the need of your prayers that God will give us strength and grace to go forward in the glorious work of winning God's ancient people for Christ.

GOOD RESULTS.

We and many dear friends were praying that good results might come from this false report, and we are glad to say that we have already seen them. Our meetings have been filled to overflowing, and many new faces have been noticed in the congregation. Of course, our object is to spread the Gospel as much as possible among our people, and the sight of these new-comers have gladdened our hearts. Among their number was a very wealthy Jew, who had read the article in the World, and came to see how the trouble came about. In a conversation after a meeting he said, "I listened to your remarks this evening, and see no reason why my people should do anything against you. You have only spoken from the Bible. They need reformation, especially those who are given to traditions. They ought to esteem you highly."

We explained to him that many sympathized with us in our preaching, and gave him a New Testament, which he promised

to read.

Baptism of a zew.

The Jewish brother mentioned in the article entitled "Sufferings of a Jewish Convert," in this number of our paper, was baptized by the Rev. C. Wolfskin, at the Greene Avenue Church, in Brooklyn, on Sunday evening, January 31st.

In both of our meetings held last Saturday, we mentioned this fact to our people, and invited them to be present at this service. Many of them accepted the invitation and came a long distance to see Brother

Levi baptized.

REMARKS BY THE PASTOR.

Brother Woelfkin spoke in a most touching manner regarding the persecutions our brother had endured, even suffering imprisonment for Chrisr's sake. He said, "We are living in a wonderful time. Some years ago you could not have gathered twenty Jews into a mission; but now, Brother Cohn cannot accommodate the large number who come to hear him preach.

Truly," said the pastor, "this is a sign that the second coming of the Lord is at

hand."

At the close of the service, many of the Jews present gathered around Brother Levi, shook him by the hand and wished him God-

speed.

We sincerely thank the members of Brother Woelfkin's church for the kindly manner in which they received our Jewish brethren and the Christian courtesy extended to them by those present. The service made a very good impression upon the Jews who were present, and they lingered, some staying in the church after the Benediction had been pronounced.

Questions by the Jews and Replies.

Question.—You state, Mr. Cohen that Jesus of Nazareth is the Son of God, how can you expect us Jews to understand this, our fathers never saw any form or any image of God. ("For ye saw no manner of similitude on the day the Lord spoke unto you in Horeb out of the midst of the fire.") Deut. 4th Chapter, 15th Verse. He is not like a man at all, and how can you make Him on the same level with men by saying that He has a Son, it is ridiculous. Then again we cannot find in our Bible where God ever married.

Answer.—Because I believe in the word of God, therefore I can state that God has a Son.

I read in Prov. 30th Chapter, 4th Verse, the following: "Who hath ascended up into heaven, or descended, who hath gathered the winds in his fists, who hath bound the waters in a garment, who hath established all the ends of the earth? What is His name, and what is his Son's name?" If thou cans't tell. Now you see, God has a Son and asks us all if we know his name, now the question is who is that Son?

God said unto David in 2d Psalm, 7th Verse: "Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee." And then again in 2d Samuel, 14th Verse, "I will be his Father and he shall be my Son." Now you see God can call any one his Son whom he desires. He created Heaven and Earth from nothing, so He is able to command that a woman shall have a child through His word alone, and this by right, He calls His Son.

Question.—Jesus says, no man hath ever seen God, now we read in Exodus 33d Chapter, from the 18th Verse: "That Moses had seen God." How can you reconcile these two.

Answer.—In 2d Corinthians, 4th Chapter, 6th Verse, we find these words: "The light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." The Lord Jesus himself says: "He who hath seen Me hath seen the Father." Now, the Old Testament teaches the same, in Isaiah, 63d Chapter, 9th Verse, we find the following: ("And the angel of His presence saved them." The Hebrew of presence ("Is face") that is the Angel of his face saved them. The Angel who saves is the Lord Jesus, the Messiah, as proven by the Scriptures. So you see that in Jesus the Messiah, God the Father dwelt bodily, therefore he who hath seen the Messiah Jesus, hath seen the Father.

Paul says: :'The glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." Moses asked, "Show me thy glory." But God says, "No man can see My face and live." (See Exodus 33-20). Moses only saw the "back parts," the face of God which is also called the Glory of God, could only be seen in the face of the Lord Jesus Christ and therefore He is called,

"The Angel of his face."
