The simple Gospel has been preached for the last two years and a half without material help to the poor Jews, some of whom have died lately from survation as published in the daily papers. Incidents in the Work. One of God's Opportunities.

One Thursday, after the afternoon session at the mission rooms, we did not return home, but tarried in Brownsville, the hour being quite late, and the time of the evening service being so near. After visiting some of the Jewish families, we went to a Jewish restaurant for supper. The room was quite well filled with people as we entered, it being situated on the main business street of the place.

After our meal was served we took the bread and, according to the Jewish custom, before eating, pronounced the following

Blessed art thou, Jehovah, our God, the king of the universe, who bringeth forth bread from the earth," as is the manner of the Rabbis. Those in the room, of course, heard this, and began asking one another, "Who is this?" There was one present who had attended our services, and he began to explain and to answer their inquiries until he had quite a gathering around him.

After a short time they came and stood around the table where we were seated. One said, "This Jewish brother said you are the missionary who preaches at 530 Rockaway Ave. Is that so?" "Yes," was the reply. "They say you persuade Jews to become Christians Is that true?" "Yes, sir," was the rejoinder. "Well, but you are a Jew; you say the blessing just like a Rabbi." "O yes, I am a Jew."

"Well, then, you are not a Christian?" "Yes, I am a Christian, too." "Well, how can you be both, please explain." At this point we asked them what they meant by being a Christian. "One said, "It is one who is not circumcised." Another said, "No, no, a Christian is one who eats pork." "No," said another, "it is not that, either. A Christian is one who does not know the God of Abraham." Here was presented the opportunity of again telling of Jesus, the true Messiah of the Jews, that He is the Christ, and that a Christian is one who follows the teachings of Christ. That, according to the word of God, spoken by His prophet, "All we, like sheep, have gone astray," and according to Moses, "Cursed is the man who does not do all the commandments." So, ander the law, we are all condemned, and yet God so loved us that He gave His only begotten son that we might be saved from this condemnation. Thus we talked at some length, teaching them that

unless they turned to Jesus and accepted Him as their Messiah, they would not have the God of Abraham as their God. They were reminded of their wanderings, and how they had been driven from one nation to another, as Jesus saw they would be when he wept over the holy city, saying, "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, thou that killest the prophets and stonest them which are sent unto thee, how often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, but ye would not! Behold, your house is left unto you desolate." Other prophetic words of Jesus were repeated, as "Not one stone shall be left upon another."

They were attentive and earnest listeners, as could be plainly seen by their faces. The room had now become crowded, and a cordial invitation was extended to them to attend our Saturday services. Many said they

would come.

When we left, one young man followed me and said, "My heart ached as you were speaking. I know this must be true." He was asked to read the New Testament carefully, and he promised to do so.

May God use and richly bless these words spoken in His name. We continue to praise Him for the privilege of telling out the good news to His chosen ones who are blind to His truth.

A Nicodemus.

We were much interested one evening watching an old Jewish man who transacts business near the Ewen Street Mission. He stood on the corner looking up and down the street with an expression that seemed to indicate that he did not wish to have any of his friends see him : realizing the coast was clear, he ran hurriedly to the door of the Mission and said in broken English, please give me one of those books in the window, referring to a Hebrew New Testament. As we handed it to him, he hid it in his bosom and thanked us in a most kindly manner for the gift and ran hurriedly across the street.

She Loves the Messiah.

A Jewess in Brownsville and her husband, both of whom believe in the Lord Jesus as the Messiah, and who are always present at our Praise Services held on Thursday evenings, said, I was very tired to-day and went to bed, suddenly it occured to me that a meeting was to be held this evening; tired as I felt, I gave up the rest I needed, and came out to hear of my beloved Messiah.

It requires considerable self-sacrifice on

the part of anyone to attend our services at the Brownsville Mission, especially after a thaw or rain storm, no matter how slight it may be. Brownsville as yet, has not been paved, and the mud is deep. Despite all this mud and the unpleasantness of the weather, or walking, our services are always well attended, many coming quite a long distance to hear the Gospel preached. We asked a Jew who comes very regularly, if it was not very hard for him to walk so far, and he replied, that he preferred muddy Saturdays to any other; for said he, when it is pleasant weather it requires little or no sacrifice for me to come to the service, but when rainy and the mud is thick and I have to wade through it to hear of Jesus the Messiah, then I know he will love and honor me the more for so doing.

THE SEWING SCHOOL GIRLS' GREAT PROGRESS.

We are thankful to God for the great progress that has been made in our Sewing School in Brownsville.

It is about two years since we started with 13 children, and the increase has been so rapid that we ofttimes have found it difficult to furnish seats for all who have come.

Those who came first were obtained by visiting the homes of their parents, some of whom had attended our preaching services and having confidence in us were glad to have their children come. Shortly after opening the school we commenced to tell the children of Jesus their Messiah. Some did not wish to listen, but this did not discourage us.

A few days ago we were talking to them from the text "God is Love," as found in 1st John 4: 8, 16. At the close of our remarks, a number of children gathered around the platform and asked to be shown the verse we had spoken from in the Bible.

WHAT A LITTLE JEWISH GIRL SAID.
Among the number was a little Jewish girl, who asked us if the verse quoted was in the Jewish or the Christian Bible. Thinking she was not pleased with it, I said, "Why, do you not like it?" She replied, "Oh yes, indeed I do. It is lovely, but we never hear such things in our Jewish meetings."

We believe in presenting these Bible truths to our children and that the seed sown is falling on good ground and will be used of Him in blessing these children.

While teaching the girls to sew the teachers have an opportunity to present to these young minds the Bible truth concerning Jesus. The children are always good listeners and put many questions that elicit fur-

ther instruction on the part of the teacher. The teacher of the very little ones asked them last Thursday if they loved Jesus. One of the girls replied, "Why, no, Jesus is dead." "But," said the teacher, "did you not know that He was dead only three days, and that He is alive now and loves you?' "No," responded the little one, "I never heard that" When asked by Mr. Cohn if she had never heard him tell that Jesus rose again, she persisted in saying, no, but two others of the class said, yes, they remem-As Jesus gathered the little Jewish bered. children about Him in the days of His earthly life and laid His hands upon them in blessing, so does He to-day as truly look in blessing upon these His lambs. May we go to them in love and tell the sweet Gospel story, for they love to hear it, and He will bless it to them now and in their after years. Another teacher was at the same time having almost an identical conversation with some other girls.

"MY WORD SHALL NOT RETURN UNTO ME

VOID.

One Saturday evening the divinity of Christ was boldly set forth to the Jews, the statement that Jehovah Himself was dwelling in Christ was made, this is a great stumbling block to the Jew and it was anticipated that many, if not all, would take such offence that they would leave the mission room. We were pleased and surprised as well to see only two who went out, murmuring as they went. One other stood and begged to be allowed to say just two or three words. He wanted to know where it was said that God dwelt in Jesus. He was answered and invited to come on Wednesday evening again, as Wednesday evening is entirely devoted to the answering of questions. The sermon was continued with quietness and attention. This is but another experience to teach us that we have nothing to fear, but to preach boldly that Jesus is the Christ, He in God and God in Him. Lord over all. At the close of this service a man about 60 years of age came up and said he was very much interested in all that had been said, and he wanted to buy a New Testament to read all about Jesus Christ. So he left the hall with a New Testament in his possession, to read for the first time the Gospel.

Will the readers of THE CHOSEN PEOPLE, unite with us in prayer for this one, that God will pour the light from these blessed pages into his soul, that he may believe in his

heart that Jesus is the Christ and his personal Saviour. As these individual cases are mentioned from time to time will you lift them up in prayer before God and you shall, by the ministry of prayer be a sharer in this work of gathering into the fold the lost ones of the House of Israel.

FOR I WILL SHOW HIM HOW GREAT THINGS HE MUST SUFFER FOR MY NAME SAKE.

-Acts 9: 16.

At the close of one of our meetings held in Ewen Street on a Friday evening, there came running after us a tall young man, he was shouting for me to stop as he wished to speak to us, looking around hastily to see that no one was near to listen to what he was about to tell us, he approached and said : "I am now convinced that the Lord Jesus is the true Messiah, I have been coming to the services for some time past, but never did the truth come home to me so forcibly as it has to-night, now, what have I got to do to belong absolutely to the Messiah." (The Jews are very ignorant of the Christian Religion, not fully understanding when they decide for Christ how they are to be baptized, so we take great pains at times to make them understand what is required of them.)

We said in reply to his question: "If you believe in the Lord Jesus and you obe his voice, you are saved from your sins, now go to your home, read and ponder well over the teaching of the New Testament, and in them you will find just what you have to do."

He followed our advice and commenced to read the New Testament and to pray in the name of Jesus his new found Messiah. Then he began to attend services at a Christian Church. During one service at which he was present they passed the bread and wine to him, he did not understand what this meant as he had never heard of the communion service, therefore he was greatly puzzled.

HIS ESTEEM FOR CHRISTIANS.

So great however, had his esteem and confidence in Christians became, that he partook of the bread and wine, thinking that in so doing it would be the final act which would make him a Christian (or in other words) that this was what Christians meant by baptism.

It was taken by him in a spirit of great devotion and with a firm Resolution in his heart to give himself fully to Christ (as he afterwards expressed it) "I thought now I stepped over to the Christians." When he arrived at home he said to his wife: "Now you shall know I have stepped over to the Christians.

This declaration made with so much earnestness was a terrible shock to his wife; she was horrlied, left the room at once, and started for New York to make known the news to her relatives and seek their advice. After hearing her story they told her to consult a lawyer and sue her husband for becoming an apostate. After listening to her the lawyer said: "That drinking the wine and eating the bread would not make her husband a Christian, that he would first have to be baptized." This seemed to comfort and quiet her down. On her return home she told her husband what the lawyer had told her and he replied, "As I have decided for Christ,

I MUST NOW BE BAPTIZED,

for I want to believe in the Messiah and must take the final step."

Troubled at his determination to become a Christian, she again appealed to her relatives telling them what he had said, and they replied, "Then you must sue him."

On her return home she said to her husband: "I married you as a Jew, and you are now going to become a Gentile, this is a great cheat, you will be arrested."

The poor fellow was greatly troubled by her threats and came to our rooms seeking advice as to what he had better do.

WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT FROM A JEWISH CONVERT.

While in conversation, there came in another Jewish convert, after listening to the conversation he told our brother "that there was no law by which his wife could sue him, for said he, "if there was, my wife who was bitter against me and tried to prevent my coming out for Christ, would surely have done this to me." After hearing these hopeful words he decided to trust Christ his Messiah for the future.

"And Jonathan, Saul's son arose and went to David into the wood and strengthened his hand in God."

An Old Jew Applies for Baptism.

Among those who came to the Saturday preaching service at Brownsville, is an old Jew, who always brings his little boy with him, and at the close of the service takes much pleasure in having us shake the little fellow by the hand. He is a bright little fellow, well behaved, and never giving us the slightest trouble; like his father, he wants a New Testament and hymn book in his hand during service. The father is a

most attentive listener and has expressed a strong desire to be baptised; he says he is a firm believer in the Lord Jesus as the True Messiah.

Eager To Hear More Of Jesus.

After one of the evening services at 17 Ewen Street, several of the audience came to the front of the room and said they would like to hear more, and would like to sit an hour longer if we would keep on talking. They followed us even out into the street saying, "We would stay till midnight if you only could and talk about these things." Thanks be to God for this fulfillment of Hosea iii: 5. "Afterward shall the children of Israel return and seek the Lord their God and David their King."

Rev. H. B. Prichard.

Brother Prichard, who on several occasions has preached Christ to the Jewish brethren, at 17 Ewen Street, kindly addressed them again this month. He pointed out seven predictions in the 22d Psalm, that were literally fulfilled in the Lord Jesus. We thank our brother for this service.

Another Christian gentleman, Mr. N. D. Spelman, witnessed to the Jews both in Brownsville and in Williamsburg. In Brownsville, he spoke from the verse found in Numbers x: 33. "And the Ark of the Covenant of the Lord went before them in the three days journey to search out a resting place for them." So Christ was three days in the grave and in Him they find rest.

At Williamsburg, he drew sweet lessons from the life of Queen Esther. The sceptre which she touched as it was held out to her by the king united her to the kink. So Christ unites us to God. We know God has blessed to many hearts the words of these his dear servants. We would be pleased to have other Christian friends come to speak for Jesus.

The Brownsville Boys.

One of the worst places for a boy is the streets of a great city, any observer passing through one of them, especially in the Tenement districts, will offtimes notice a number of boys engaged in pitching pennies, a pastime which is the first stepping stone to the life of a gambler. There are hundreds of boys in Brownsville who live in the vicinity of our Mission Rooms, who after school is over have nothing to occupy their minds. There is nothing very attractive in their houses and very little attention paid by their parents to them at their home training, for

the simple reason that the parents have too much to do to keep the wolf from the door and provide a living for the family.

Realizing the danger which surrounds these boys, some time ago we organized a Boys' Club, our object was to gather in as many of them as we could, and give them a good religious training. We started with 13 members and at present have about 50 names on our Roll book. They meet every Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. The meeting is opened with prayer, and then seated around a long table they study for about three quarters of an hour the word of God. It is a most pleasing sight to see them. They give respectful and earnest attention to the exposition of the word. Several days ago the boys were asked if they would like to read through the books of Genesis and St. Matthews, and when it was put to a vote every hand was raised, so that we are now studying these two books. When we first started our meeting it seemed almost impossible to keep the boys quiet during the opening prayer, but by the spirit of kindness we have them now so trained that we have almost perfect order. While expounding the criptures they frequently ask us questions; one boy asked, "Why did God allow Satan to persuade Eve to sin?" Another one said, "Why did God create Satan at all?"

We replied: "If there was no Satan to persuade man against the will of God, there would be no chance for a man to show his faithfulness to God.

The boys are very fond of music and when asked what they would like to sing, most always ask for "Down at the Cross," or "Bringing in the Sheaves." Considering the way they have been allowed to run around the streets we feel, in the short time that the club has been in existence that much good has been accomplished, and that the seed which is being sown will eventually bring forth good fruit. After the religious part of the meeting is concluded, the boys sit at the tables and play games, or else go in the lots and have a game of foot ball. They seem to appreciate all we are doing for them, we trust they may grow up to be good men and do a mighty work for Jesus their Messiah.

Suffering in Brownsville.

Doubtless many of our readers read an account published in the Dailies several days ago, of the great suffering among the Jews in Brownsville. This account was not overdrawn in the least,

visits made to the homes of many of our brethren have fully confirmed it. The suffering is very great, many are turned out upon the streets on account of their inability to meet the rent. Children are running around bare footed and hungry. A few days ago a lady visiting our Saturday afternoon service, noticed a little Jewish girl whose feet were sticking out of an old pair of shoes. It was a cold day and as she saw the child's feet, her thin clothing, her heart was moved to pity, and a day or two after-wards, one little heart was made glad by receiving a new pair of shoes. We wish there were many others like our kind friend whose hearts might be touched by the sufferings of these little ones. Many of these children, like their parent's, will suffer any-thing rather than beg. Since writing our last article several have died from hunger, and want of proper treatment; we feel constrained to bring this matter to the attention of our readers; we do it with an earnest prayer that God may touch some hearts, to help these suffering ones in this great hour GEO. C. SALTER. of their need.

The sewing school is now being carried on without any salaried workers. Children of God who are trying to advance the Kingdom of Christ are now helping in this work. At present there are eight volunteer workers, but we need many more. The harvest is truly great but the labourers are few. We would like to see you present at the Mission Rooms, 530 Rockaway Avenue, any Thursday afternoon, from 3:30 to 5 o'clock. "Come thou with us and we will thee good."

Any one who understands plain sewing can teach the children, and while doing this will find the little ones, like Mary of old, willing to sit at your feet and learn of Jesus.

Visitors are always welcome. Come and join your voices with ours in the singing of the Gospel hymns. The children quickly learn these hymns and love to sing them.

The Needs of the Work. TRACTS AND HEBREW BIBLES.

On account of lack of means to purchase Jewish, Hebrew, English and German tracts, we have a very small distribution of literature among the Jews. We would also write, ourselves, by the help of God, such pamphlets and tracts which would prove most useful in the spreading of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. There are many who, after having heard many a time the wonderful story of the cross, are provoked to

jealousy, and desire to search the Old Testament, whether these things are so that Jesus of Nazareth is the promised Messiah, but are unable to buy a Hebrew Bible. What shall we do with these lost sheep of the house of Israel?

EMPLOYMENT.

We wish some philanthropic and enterprising gentleman, or company could be induced to start an industrial plant and give employment to those who are thrown out of work by reason of their belief in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Several of those who believe and were bold enough to speak of Christ now and then to their brethren, are in great need. Most of them are tailors. They are willing to do anything to earn an honest living. Can any of our readers give employment to these worthy persons? Will you let us know?

The Jews are quick to observe any thing that may appear on the walls of the mission room. They will stand for a long time, reading a Scripture text very carefully. We believe that the old messianic prophecies, painted in large letters and placed upon the walls, would do much to advance the cause

of Jesus Christ. We would be glad to place some in our large windows. They would be good preachers all the day long. Would you like to furnish that silent preacher?

Some Texts.

We have upon the walls of the mission room, several texts in Hebrew, as John 3: 16, and others. Directly in the front of the room is the Lord's Prayer in Hebrew. Those who come early walk around the room, looking at these texts and at the illustrations of Sunday School lessons which have been given to us. They come up before the service or after the service and request us to point out just where these verses are. The Jews always want to know just where a Scripture verse is, and to read it for themselves. It is very interesting to hear them instructing one another, or trying to.

One thing that seems very strange to a Christian is that the Jew will not bow his head in prayer, nor does he think it a part of worship, for their prayers are set prayers, which they have learned to repeat, though many of them but little refer to the needs of the individual; they do not know what to do nor how to act when prayer is being offered. Telling your needs to God in your own language seems presumptuous to them.

Questions by the Jews and Replies.

Question-How can it be that our Messiah has already come, and that he is the Jesus you preach about? Is it not written in our Bible that "In his days Judah shall be saved, and Israel shall dwell safely," (Jer. 23: 6). And again, does it not say "The wolf also shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with a kid, the calf and the young lion, and the cow and the bear shall feed together, and the lion shall eat straw, like the ox," Isaiah 11: 6, 7). These are the promises of God in connection with the appearance of our Messiah, and you say that He has already Now, where is the salvation of Judah, and the safe dwelling of Israel, or this great peace, spoken of in this prophecy? What has Jesus done to fulfill these predictions? Are not we Jews hated and persecuted by the Christians? Is there not war between one nation and another? The world is just the same as it was before the coming of Christ.

Answer—Judah cannot have the salvation promised to them because they do not want to accept it. No man can satisfy his craving for food by lying down and refusing to eat. Jesus, our Messiah, mourned over Jerusa-

lem. Did He not say, "How often would I have gathered ye, etc., but ye would not?" I myself am one of the house of Judah. I, too, once cherished your idea, but since I accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as my Messiah, I am saved, and have peace in my heart toward all mankind. If you will accept and believe in Him, Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell safely. Only trust Him.

Question—According to the New Testament, and what you have just stated, the reason why we Jews have been punished by God, by having our temple destroyed, as Jesus prophesied, "Your house shall be left desolate unto you," and by having been driven out of our country, and being left so long in captivity, is because we crucified Christ.

ow did not Jesus himself say, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do?" Now, if our fathers were forgiven for this act, why should we be punished?

Answer—Forgiveness can only be granted as laid down in the Word of God, for it is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul. God cannot change that, for is it not written, "I am Jehovah—I change not?"

The rule of atonement through blood is

The rule of atonement through blood is well explained in the Book of Leviticus. "If a soul shall sin through ignorance, etc." And again, "And if the whole congregation of Israel sin through ignorance," (Lev. 4: 2-13) so that the blood would not atone for

presumptuous sins.

When the Lord Jesus, whose blood maketh atonement for our souls, said, "Father, forgive them, etc.," He referred to the rule above by adding, "For they know not what they do." That is to say, "Father, I now suffer for all their sins, and am ready to be sacrificed for them, according to thy word. Sin done in ignorance has to be atoned for through the blood, so forgive them this sin, for they did it in ignorance." The Lord Jesus says he gave his life as a ransom for Surely, he loved us infinitely, and would have liked to have forgiven our father's sins. Although the crucifixion seemed a little presumptuous, yet the good and blessed Lord advocated for them, and said, "For they know not what they do." This he did according to Isaiah 53: 12, but the Jews, as a nation, refused to believe or accept the forgiveness offered through the blood of the Lamb of God. And God so loves you that he is waiting every day for you to receive his offer of pardon through the blood of Jesus, our Lord, as it is written "to-day, if you will hear his voice. Harden not your heart."
