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This work was started in 1894, by LEOPOLD COHN, in obedience to the call of God. With no friends to back him, he placed full reliance on the Lord who through His children, has sent the necessary funds. Meetings are held for adults and Sunday and Sewing Schools, for children. A Medical Department is maintained to assist the poor Jews, treating about 20,000 patients annually. The Poor Fund contributed to by many friends, enables the workers to relieve the distress of deserving Jews and to give a practical demonstration of Christian love. The Literature Fund, used to purchase Hebrew Bibles and Testaments and to print tracts in Jewish, is a most important part of the work. Mr. Cohn has written seven Jewish tracts himself which have been used of God to the conversion of many.

Our method is that of Paul, "To the Jew I became as a Jew." Our testimony is that of Jews to Jews. The administration of the work is distinctively Jewish; Mr. Cohn himself was formerly a Rabbi. Under God's wonderful guidance and mercy, the Williamsburg Mission to the Jews has grown and developed in a remarkable way. Thousands of Jews have been led to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ through its ministry. We earnestly covet your prayers and your sympathy. "Come thou with us and we will do thee good." "We go to Salute the Children of the King" II. Kings 10; 13

My Dearly Beloved Friends :---

Upon the entrance of 1915, I greet you with good wishes for a blessed and joyous year. For the safe passage of this ominous New Year may I suggest to you as a motto, Micah 2:13, "And their King shall pass before them and the Lord (Jehovah) on the head of them.'

CLAIM GOD'S PROMISES.

The above prophecy was primarily given to the Jews, pointing to their restoration. The Lord Jesus Himself being "the breaker" (first part of verse) will then destroy all their enemies and deliver them out of "the time of Jacob's trouble." But these words have a peculiar application for the true Church of the Lord Jesus Christ in their individual lives. It has a striking reference to John 14:23, where the Lord Jesus promised that He. the great King and the Father, Jehovah, (corresponding to the two persons in Micah 2:13,) will make their abode with us. It seems that now is the time when we most need this application. At no other time, since the Christian era began, has the Church of Christ entered a new year in which so large a part of the world has been so devastated by such a murderous holocaust. Every part of this world in its commercial as well as its moral life, has been shocked and rudely awakened. The cannon's roar in the countries at war is rising loud and sweeping across the countries at peace. It is ringing in the ears of leaders, statesmen and lawgivers. It causes them to apprehend greater calamity; it makes them ask in perplexity, "What is coming over us," and something makes them feel that the European conflagration is spreading and threatening to leap across the wide, deep ocean. The world may dread all these pending horrors, because it refused to submit to the righteous King. "They chose new gods, then was war in the gates." Judges 5:8. They may call themselves Christians, but their deeds in persecuting God's ancient people strongly deny their calling. 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EDITORIAL.

The Keeper of Israel. For the busiest month in our history, we thank you. You have responded with a zest and a will that has been inspiring. We must confess that we approached the closing weeks of the year with the least bit of apprehension; everybody was talking hard times, every mission board was sending out signals of distress, and these conditions began to bear their impress upon us also. But we forgot that wonderful promise of Psalm 121:3 and 4, "He that keepeth thee will not slumber. Behold he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep." God has fulfilled this promise to the very letter, and with grateful hearts to Him, as well as with deep gratitude to you who have so nobly come to our help in answer to His bidding, we take up our tasks for the new year, renewed in hope, enlarged in vision, and enthused with the zeal of the Lord. For 1915 we want to have the very best year that the mission has ever experienced. and we want that the Word of God shall be preached in greater convicting power to His brethren in the flesh than ever before. With God's continued blessing and with your faithful co-operation we trust and believe that these things will be accomplished.

We may say for your joy that at this writing enough money has been received to close our books for the year without a dollar of indebtedness and with a small balance for the new year; and this is written three days before the end of the year, so you can see how wonderfully the Lord has filled your hearts with the spirit of giving at a time when giving, to the material world, was a thing that seemed audacious to expect. It again illustrates that He who has been watching over this mission from the days of its infancy, will

never allow it to suffer retrenchment or the disgrace which would inevitably come if we were compelled to go into debt.

Wise As a Serpent. How we wish that all Christians were possessed of just a little bit of worldly wisdom. We are living in the world and we must deal with it day after day; how important for us to know what weapons to use in such dealings. Christ Himself warned us on this point when he said, "Behold I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ve therefore wise as serpents and harmless as doves." It is this wisdom and this harmlessness that we need in this present wicked age. In response to our warnings we have received numerous inquiries from our friends concerning individuals who claim to be conducting Jewish missionary work or to be Jewish evangelists. Some have sent us literature which they received from such individuals and in one case where the individual in question is a rank wicked fraud, our correspondent remarked, "I cannot see how he can be a fraud when he writes such beautiful things, and his literature sounds so holy!" In these days of deceiving and being deceived, will you not bear in mind that the devil himself puts on the garb of a saint and tries to deceive the very elect. Let us give you one or two suggestions how you yourself can detect a fraud in Jewish work. The first thing for you to find out is whether the person claiming to do Jewish work has a group of responsible Christian men who are vouching for him; if he has, you ought to write to them and find out for yourself just exactly what they think of him. Secondly, you should search diligently to see if he gives an honest report of all moneys received and spent, or if he keeps these things hidden. We are told by the apostle to provide things honest in the sight of all men and this is one of the relentless tests upon which you should insist. It is an easy matter for a fraud to print an account of expenses and receipts, but you should find out whether some responsible people have vouched for that account. You will

also find that a fraud is usually vague until you know absolutely that such in his statements and often extravagant in his claims; of such be very, very, careful. Find out exactly where such a one is doing his work and whether he really does have meetings for Jews. If there is the least suspicion in your mind it will be far safer for you not to give, than for you to encourage deception.

All these things we, as a mission, have faithfully tried to observe; we have, through God's grace, done our part in building up a work which can command the confidence of every thinking man and woman, a work which is carried on openly, concerning which you can find out every detail whether it be in matters spirital or in matters financial; our books are open to any contributor to our work at any time. Any friend of our work or any prospective friend may write at any time to any representative Christian leade: anywhere in this country and will receive a word of commendation concerning our work; this rule is almost invariable. We take great pains in things financial to acknowledge publicly through the columns of THE CHOSEN PEOPLE every dollar that is received, and this we do in spite of the protest of some friends who feel that we are wasting space in doing so; it is simply in accordance with our policy to provide things honest in the sight of all men. You can realize therefore what a disappointment and grief it is to us and to others, who like us have striven faithfully to maintain an honest work, to see our friends sometimes led astray and in their earnest zeal to do God's will become deceived by someone who ought not to have a bit of their confidence.

INCIDENTS IN THE WORK. Another Baptism.

The brother who has been baptized since the last issue of THE CHOSEN PEOPLE is a young man of twenty-six, who formerly was a socialist. Although he was brought up religiously in Russia and read the Bible (this means to the Jew the Pentateuch and Psalms) yet he drifted into atheism and finally delighted only in socialistic and anarchistic books. He utilized every opportunity for talking in public about these "isms." Some time ago he thought he would visit the mission as he had heard people talk so much about it. After attending once he felt a desire to return and so k pt on coming to our meetings until he professed belief in the Lord Jesus Christ. He is zealous and gives ardent testimonies at our Monday evening meetings.

The most interesting feature of hi; baptism was that it took place on Thanksgiving night when through the generosity of our dear friends we were enabled to give a dinner to 45 Hebrew Christians. As soon as we were through eating we opened a meeting for praise and thanksgiving to God. Nearly every one of the brethren was anxious to speak. There was a wonderful spirit pervading the hearts of all who were gathered that evening. The only Gentile Christians among us were the Misses Sussdorff and Bigelow who have been coworking with this mission from the very start, about 19 years ago. Miss Sussdorff in her brief talk recalled what hardships this mission had in its infancy but as the Word of God says, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." So it has been in our case. Thanks be to God that we can see now the fruitage of the appointed sufferings that we had to bear.

The testimonies given by the brethren were remarkable, for the utterances that they gave, forcibly testified that the Holy Spirit was dictating the words.

One man related some of his experiences after he had confessed Christ publicly. His fellow workers hated and persecuted him. When he patiently endured all these trials they asked the employer to discharge him. When called to the office and told that he must either quit the work or promise to give up faith in Christ, he boldly answered that he would not give up his belief in the Son of God. no matter whether the employer gave him work or not. Finally he was discharged but soon found a better position which convinced him that all the difficulties were for his best and he praises God for His goodness.

A boy of about nineteen who belongs to our little church and has been a member in good standing ever since he was baptized about a year ago, told us how he went to a small synagogue where a number of aged Jews were sitting, reading the book of Psalms. The Jews read their prayers and Psalms and the Pentateuch in Hebrew which the vast majority do not understand. The boy asked one of them whether he knew what he was reading and to impart to him some of the contents of the Psalms. The aged Jew became indignant and there followed a hot controversy during which the boy confessed that he believed in the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour from sin. The old feeble hand flung into the boy's face several times. He said that he then literally fulfilled that which the Lord enjoined, "Whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other."

A sister who was there with her husband, both of whom were baptized long ago, gave us a very striking testimony. She told us how much patience she had with her relatives who tried with all their cunning tricks to win her from Christ, but instead, some of them have been brought to join her in the faith of our Lord. She therefore urged every believer not to rest until they had brought their relatives to accept Christ.

One of the most touching testimonies was that of a young man who also related his sufferings for Christ's sake. He pointed out his younger brother who sat beside him, who used to persecute him more than anybody else. When he sat down, the younger brother rose and with tear-dimmed eyes confessed that he had once hated his brother on account of his belief in Christ but since he began to attend our meetings he too became convinced of the truth and now both are loving each other and rejoicing in the salvation of the Lord.

Leadings of the Holy Spirit.

One evening I addressed the audience from Acts 4: 12, "There is none other name under Heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Illustrating my thought, I said, "In business and social life there are well established rules which govern people; rules which cannot be changed by any individual to suit his selfish desires. Where there are no rules there must be confusion and anarchy for what would become of our lives and property if there were not a government to establish rules and make us obey ordinances. The spiritual world is analogous to the material in the respect that it also has rules." It was shown that for a Jew to secure eternal life, or as they call it, the future world, there are a large number of ways and means to achieve that end. Some of the ancient rabbis taught that if the Jews only keep the Sabbath their sins will be forgiven them even if they had worshipped idols. Others again said that if they practise circumcision they will never be sent to hell, for Abraham always watches at the gate of hell and admits no Jew who is circumcised. The Jewish women again have three ordinances to keep, one being the lighting of candles on Friday evening in honor of the Sabbath, and they have been assured that the observance of the three will surely bring them to Heaven. But after all these and many others have been carried out by a Jew, when he dies his only hope is centered in his sons who repeat in the synagogue, morning and evening for a whole year less a month, that

short prayer called Kaddish, and thus gradually pull him out of hell. These and many other inventions have come to our Jewish people from the ancient rabbis and a thinking Jew gets confused for there seems to be no rule by which he can be guided in the right way. This sad state of affairs in the Jewish spiritual world is like a busy street-crossing, wagons, automobiles, street cars, and pedestrians all coming from different directions converging at one point, horses and people meeting face to face, a condition in which disaster must be the inevitable concomitant. So the government puts a policeman there to avert all accidents. He gives the command to every one which way to turn and it must be obeyed unchangingly. God also saw the confusion and contradictory ideas of our ancient rabbis and so gave one rule which must strictly be followed in order to avoid disaster and procure happiness. That rule is, "There is no other name"-no such name as circumcision, no such name as Sabbath, and no such name as Kaddish, but the name of Jesus His only begotten Son that can save us from our sins.

After we left the meeting a Jew of about 34 accompanied me nearly to the house and told me the following story: "Last week I went to a synagogue to repeat Kaddish for my dear father. While in the act of solemnly uttering that prayer an officer of the synagogue roughly threw me out. This he did because I did not pay fifty cents. I would have done so but I did not have the money. I became much discouraged and having heard of you I came to your meeting. How surprised I was when you spoke about Kaddish just as if you had known my thoughts and my experience. I have no doubt now that God has spoken to me through you. I am not going to believe any more in such things as Kaddish but I have put my trust tonight in Jesus in whom you believe."

This man felt so happy that he was raised to costatic joy saying that God spoke to him directly. He embraced and kissed me and gave glory to God the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. stretched out to receive me. I threw

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question. What do the years 2520 signify? Is it the time of the Jewish National Rejection? If so, what was the date of the beginning and when does it close? -L. M. Ashley.

Answer. There is no such number of years or days mentioned in the Bible. We suppose you refer to some scholar's conjectural discussions on the "Times of the Gentiles." Some assume that the Times of the Gentiles began with the capture of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar. From that year until now 2520 years have elapsed. The termination of this period, they assert, will usher in the restoration of the Jews to their promised land. This they base on Lev. 26:18 where it was foretold that the Jews would be punished seven times for their sins. They take the expression "seven times" for seven prophetic years, allowing 360 days to the year, and counting a day for a year. The 360 prophetic days are

Jews.

multiplied by 7 and make the 2520 years as the Times of the Gentiles to subjugate and tread down Jerusalem as a fulfillment of the "seven times" punishment. But these conclusions insofar as they are based on this one verse, Lev. 26:18, are erroneous. The Hebrew of Lev. 26:18 savs "seven" and does not imply periods, but plagues. This is made apparent in verse 21, "I will increase upon you seven plagues according to your sins." Verse 24, "But if ye will not hearken," etc., enumerates seven different kinds of sins, (this is indicated in the Hebrew only) hence seven plagues according to the seven sins. A closer study of verses 14 and 15, in the original Hebrew and in connection with the greatest Jewish authoritative commentaries, reveals seven distinct sins, as follows: 1st sin, "Ye will not hearken," meaning, not studying; 2nd sin, "and will not do all these commandments," meaning, not doing; 3rd sin, "ye shall despise my statutes," meaning, despising those who keep these statutes." 4th sin. "abhor my judgments," meaning, despising wise men, judges; 5th sin, "ye will not do," Hebrew meaning, to interfere with others who want to do; 6th sin, "all my commandments," meaning to deny that the commandments are Godgiven; 7th sin, "ye break my covenant," meaning, to deny the Godhead by breaking the covenant. For these seven sins, therefore, seven corresponding plagues are promised; we see clearly now that the verse distinctly means seven plagues, and not seven "times." Besides, Nebuchadnezzar made four campaigns against Jerusalem, making an interval of about 20 years between the first invasion when King Jehojachin was dethroned and the complete destruction of Jerusalem in the days of King Zedekiah. Which then is the starting point to measure The Times from? Again, the Lord's utterance: "Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles," Luke 21:24, was made over 500 years after the destruction of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar. After seventy years of captivity the Jews rebuilt the temple and the scepter of Judah was resumed and was not removed until Shiloh, the Lord Jesus, came. Gen. 49:10. Therefore, the times of the Gentiles began with the death of Herod the Great, who was the last king of the

JEWISH NOTES.

With the entrance of Turkey into the war the Jewish leaders have set about to consider securing Palestine for the possession of their people. They have been encouraged greatly by a speech of the Prime Minister of England in which he said that the Ottoman government itself has rung the death knoll of its dominion not only in Europe, but in Asia. One leading Jewish newspaper says: "If the Ottoman dominion is to cease in Asia, Jews, at least, for their own sakes, ought to keep their eyes upon Palestine." Another writes: "These are truly days of destiny-heroic times which rise but once in a thousand years. And the Jews-the Jewish people? Oh, for one hour of Hertzel, or that man of genius and imagination, Disraeli." Consequently mass meetings were held in large Jewish centers, London, Brooklyn and New York, devising means and ways how to present at the supposed congress which the powers will hold after the war, the Jewish cause and claim upon the promised land. Poor blind leaders, they pretend to look into the future when the war will be over, but are blind to see the Word of God which savs, "Behold, I will make Jerusalem a cup of trembling unto all the people round about, when they shall be in the siege both against Judah and against Jerusalem. And in that day will I make Jerusalem a burdensome stone for all people." Zech. 12:2-3. If their eyes could see the trouble that is pending for Jerusalem before Christ comes again, as outlined in the word of God, they would not be so anxious to acquire the land. But. the Word of God must be fufilled precisely in the way it was foretold.

Rabbi in giving his opinion that this is the beginning of the restoration of the Jews to Palestine takes the abundance of the latter rainfall as one of the strongest signs for this belief. He quotes Lev. 26:32, "And I will bring the land into desolation; and your enemies which dwell therein shall be astonished at it." The greatest Jewish commentary, Rashi, says that it is promised that enemies will not find any pleasure in the Jewish land. But now that the Jews are beginning to reinhabit it, God is causing the latter rain to return to that land in abundance. He would not allow rain to come for the benefit of their enemies, but He is giving it plentifully to His own people who are about to possess the land God promised to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

When the Germans took the city of Loenhein, France, the Commander-in-chief of the army ordered the city bombarded because some of the French civilians, out of loyalty to France shot at the German soldiers. Rabbi Bomberger effected a peaceful settlement in the following way: he put on his praying shawl and phylacteries which gave him an awe inspiring appearance and went out to meet the Commander-in-chief. He asked him not to ruin the whole city of honest people because of a few unruly Frenchmen. He further reminded the commander of the fact that God granted unto Abraham his petition not to destroy Sodom if he found ten righteous men there. He offered himself as a vassal and security that the people would give the city to the Germans in a peaceful way and no one would raise a hand against them. She finally asked, "If Christ was the Messiah, why did He not save Himself?" That opened the way for the story of the Cross and when I left she thanked me and took a tract.

One of the little girls that come to our meetings with her mother told her mother that she feels in her heart that when she gets big she will "speech" to people like Miss Sussdorff.

At one meeting, during the time given for testimony, a woman who was with us for the first time, said, "May I say a word?" When permission was granted she continued, "My dear sisters, I am thankful for what I heard today and at the Sunday evening meeting. I have a boy of thirteen whom I took to two Hebrew schools, begging the rabbi to teach him Kaddish (a prayer for the dead) since his father was dead. I could not afford a Hebrew teacher I said, but they closed the door in my face. 'No money, no lessons in Hebrew.'

"Then I made up my mind to go to the mission and take my boy there. As I entered the door, some Jews standing outside, said, 'Don't go in there. They teach about Jesus.' 'It is none of your business where I go,' I replied. 'I have tried two schools, begging the rabbis of both to teach my boy Kaddish, but was refused. Now I am going to the mission,' and I am glad I came in here."
