



"For unto us a child is born, to us a son is given" (Isaiah 9:6). Only thirteen words, but these thirteen words have changed the course of history. They have fulfilled the hope of the ages. Yet Israel and the nations still refuse to accept the true meaning of Christmas.

God had promised that He would in the fullness of time send forth His Messiah, made of a woman. God kept His Word, and while the nations and Rome were seeking to conquer the world, a Child was born, a Son was given. In Bethlehem, in Judea, in fulfillment of the prophets, Yeshua (Jesus) was born (Mic. 5:2; Lk. 2:1-7).

The world did not herald His birth. Instead, the heavenly hosts spoke His praises. Mary and Joseph, the shepherds in the fields, the aged Simeon only a few, only a remnant reacted joyfully to His birth. But the leaders of Israel and the nations of the world chose to ignore Him. "He came unto his own and his own received him not" (Jn. 1:11).

The Jewish leaders who lived at the time of the birth and death of Yeshua knew the prophecies concerning the Messiah. They not only expected Him to come, they eagerly looked forward to His coming. Yet, "his own received him not." Why? There is but one answer. Steeped in religious tradition and worship, they failed to listen to the Spirit of God. Sin had blinded their hearts to God's truth.

Likewise, the nations, caught up in their paganism and superstition, also failed to listen to the Spirit of God. Sin had also blinded their hearts to God's

Today, the Jewish people do not recognize the birthday of Yeshua — the One born King of the Jews. But the nations, following their pagan traditions, set aside December 25 to celebrate the birthday of Jesus, though they do not celebrate His birth in spirit and in truth: The majority of people who "keep Christmas" care little for its true meaning. They "worship" a good-natured old man in a red suit and a white beard rather than the new-born babe. To many, Christmas is a time of drunken revelry. Others are simply concerned about whether or not they will get as much as they give.

Christmas is so often celebrated as a pagan holiday because the One who was born in Bethlehem has not been born in the hearts of many who profess His name. Christmas is not for the world. The cross is for the world. It is only when one has been to Calvary that he can gratefully experience the glorious fact of Bethlehem.

And so at this season the world is once more saying, "Merry Christmas." We, too, would like to be merry, but not like the world. We remember that the prodigal son wanted to be "merry" away from his father. The godly can be merry when the prodigal son returns to his father. We rejoice and are merry when we see Jewish and Gentile people accepting Yeshua as the Child who was born and the Son who was given, when they proclaim Him as Lord and

This Christmas let us as believers share the true meaning of Christmas with our Jewish and Gentile friends. Let us share with them God's greatest gift to this world — our Messiah, our Savior, the Lord Jesus.







The Virgin Birth: Joseph's Journey From Skepticism To Belief

he virgin birth is one of the essential features of the Christmas story. For the Jewish people it has always been a stumbling block. Most Christians automatically accept the supernatural elements of our Messiah's birth. But like any miracle it tests the limits of our finite understanding.

How do we make peace with this overwhelming event? Thankfully, we have the example of one who had good cause to be skeptical, one whose personal reputation was at stake — loseph.

Is it mere coincidence that the account of Joseph's journey from skepticism to belief has been preserved in Matthew 1:18-25? Or is God showing us something about leaning not on our own understanding but trusting Him?

How do we make peace with this overwhelming event? Thankfully, we have the example of one who had good cause to be skeptical.

Betrothal vs. Engagement

The problems Joseph faced varied. First, Miriam's pregnancy occurred when she was betrothed to Joseph. Betrothal was not like a modern engagement; it was considered marriage. Termination required a bill of divorce, not just cancellation of the wedding hall. One of the purposes of betrothal was to test the purity of the bride. Imagine, if you will, how any of us would respond in a similar situation: A supposedly virgin wife is made pregnant by the Holy Spirit! Just think of the reaction in our churches!

A second problem (described in Mt. 1:19) was Joseph's righteousness. As a truly righteous person, he did not desire to marry a girl who was impure and unfaithful. As a moral person, he did not want to join himself to someone who did not share his standards.

To somewhat complicate matters, Joseph had a tender heart. He did not

want to disgrace Miriam publicly. It wasn't only her shame of being an unwed mother. According to Jewish law (the Mishnah), an adulteress was to be brought to the Eastern Gate. There, a priest would tear her garments, remove all her jewelry, and clothe her in black or ugly garments tied by a rope. The purpose was "to disgrace her." Furthermore, "everyone who wishes to behold her comes to behold . . . and all women are permitted to behold her, as it is said, "And that all women may be taught not to do after your lewdness"" (Sotah 1:6).

A Private Divorce

Joseph did not wish to humiliate Miriam, but he did intend to seek a private divorce. Miriam would not be brought before the Beth Din (rabbinical court). Only her father and two witnesses would be notified. Before Joseph could act, however, the Lord sent an angel in a dream.

Matthew records four proofs to Miriam's virginity. The first is the message to Joseph. The timing of this is as important as the message itself. According to Jewish law, once the divorce action is taken, it is unretractable and remarriage was impossible. God's message came in the nick of time, and it came in a supernatural way, just as had the

pregnancy itself. That the message came in a dream was, in the religious order of that day, a good omen that was to be obeyed.


Divine Naming

The second proof was the naming of Messiah (Mt. 1:21). The angel told Jo-

seph that the child's name was Yeshua (meaning "salvation"). This was significant to all who knew rabbinic teaching. There were six people whose names were given before birth: Isaac, Ishmael, Moses, Solomon, Josiah, and the name of Messiah. Since all the others had already been born, perhaps Joseph recognized that this was the promised Messiah. At the very least, he understood that this was no ordinary child. This divine naming did much to convince Joseph that the pregnancy was indeed miraculous and was pleasing to God.

The third proof of the supernatural birth does not come from the mouth of the angel, but from the pen of Matthew. He cites Isaiah 7:14 to confirm the angel's message with Scripture.

Finally, we must take a look at Joseph's actions. He took Miriam as his wife. As a sign of respect, he did not have relations with her until the birth of the child. He called the name of the child Yeshua. All these acts demonstrate that Joseph sincerely be-



lieved in Miriam's purity and the supernatural nature of her pregnancy.

Half-hearted Charge

If Joseph, the man with the most at stake, could be convinced, we must take his testimony seriously. Some people might pawn it off by saying that Joseph was duped, that he was naive or fooled because he did not understand "nature." This half-hearted charge was well dealt with by C. S. Lewis in God in the Dock:

But there is one thing often said about our ancestors which we must not say. We must not say, "They believed in miracles because they did not know the Laws of Nature." This is nonsense. When Joseph discovered that his bride was pregnant, he was "minded to put her away." He knew enough biology for that. Otherwise, of course, he would not have regarded pregnancy as a proof of infidelity. When he accepted the . . . explanation, he regarded it as a miracle precisely because he knew enough of the Laws of Nature to know this was a suspension of them.


In many ways, Joseph is the forgotten man at Christmas. Yet his was one of the first testimonies we have that Jesus, Yeshua, was the Messiah. His response is a witness to those who reject the virgin birth.

What better time than at Christmas to emulate this righteous man and bow down to the sovereign God who performed this miracle and sent Mes-



"Why did Matthew include this account of Messiah's birth? Whenever I examine a passage of Scripture I try to understand what was on

HANUKKAH STORY

To be read by the teacher of his or her class. The story's emphasis is the miracle of God's providing light.

APPLICATION

With the rededication of the Temple, the people could continue to go and worship God. The Jewish people looked to the day that the promised Messiah would come.

Messiah did come; His name is Jesus, or Yeshua. In John 10:14, we read how Jesus described Himself as the Good Shepherd. Many did not believe Jesus was the Messiah, but some of the Jewish people did believe in Jesus. Jesus describes Himself as the "Light of the world" (Jn. 8:12). (Refer to the shammus-servant candle on the Hanukkah menorah.)

The same is true for us today. At this time of year we celebrate the birth of Jesus the Messiah, but not everyone has personally believed in Him as their Savior. Without knowing Jesus, people live in spiritual darkness. Some Jewish people don't believe in Jesus as their Messiah. We can share how Jesus is the Light of the world to our Jewish friends by

- Understanding that Jesus was Jewish and our Scriptures are Jewish.
- Sharing how Jesus fulfilled all the prophecies about how Messiah would be born, live, and die.
- 3. Praying for Jewish people to receive Messiah, especially those in your school or neighborhood.
- 4. Living as believers, we are "lights" in the world. Live as lights in the way you talk, act, and think.


MAKE A MENORAH

MATERIALS NEEDED

Stiff paper, tag, or lightweight cardboard (9" X 12"), scissors, yellow construction paper, glue, ruler and pencil.

CONSTRUCTION

- Use the ruler to divide the paper into three equal sections.
- 2. Then mark off a very narrow strip of the third section. This is your tab for gluing the piece together.
- 3. Fold the first (top) section down evenly over the second or middle section, and press firmly on the fold.
- Make 18 evenly spaced, parallel cuts halfway into the two folded sections as pictured to make the candles.
- Fold and glue the tab in place as shown to make the menorah stand.
- 6. Invert every other "candle" by folding it down into the base as shown. You will have nine candles standing.
- 7. Cut out nine flames from yellow paper, and glue one to the top of each candle.



The Prophet Daniel

In previous months: God speaks to Nebuchadnezzar three times: once in a dream about the great image and again when Daniel was in the fiery furnace. For the third and final time God speaks to Nebuchadnezzar in a dream predicting that his mind will be changed from human to animal.

edical science tells us that there is a disease called lycanthropy. It is a psychosis where one actually believes he has become a wolf. Perhaps it was this or a similar type of disease that God used to judge Nebuchadnezzar. Interestingly, the annals of the Babylonian kings also record the disappearance of Nebuchadnezzar. There even seems to be some reference to the madness that befell King Nebuchadnezzar.

During this seven-year period no other Babylonian king arose to take over the empire from Nebuchadnezzar. When the seven years had been completed, Nebuchadnezzar raised his eyes toward heaven, his sanity restored. "Then I praised the Most High. I honored and glorified him who lives forever. His dominion is an eternal dominion; his kingdom endures from generation to generation. All the peoples of the earth are regarded as nothing. He does as He pleases with the powers of heaven and the peoples of the earth. No one can hold back his hand or say to him: "What have you done?"" (Dan. 4:34-35).

I believe that through this third encounter with the God of Israel, Nebuchadnezzar finally became a believer. He states, "Now I, Nebuchadnezzar, praise and exalt and glorify the King of Heaven, because everything he does is right and all his ways are just. And those who walk in pride he is able to humble" (Dan. 4:37).

I wonder how many of us could say the same thing: "God, everything You do is right and all of Your ways are just"? It's easy to say this when everything is going our way, but when the path of life becomes rocky, when we are in the pit of despair, when there's not enough money, when illness strikes, or when death sends its cold chill through our families, can we say of God, "Everything You do is right and all of Your ways are just"?

Surrender and Contentment

When we are able to come to that point of surrender, we are able to be content. We are able to live at peace with ourselves and with one another. The vision and experience of Nebuchadnezzar are truly unique in Scripture. Remember that he was the head of the Gentile nations that God was

using to bring judgment and chastisement upon Israel.

The period of judgment was to last for 70 years.

We know also from history that the extent of the Babylonian captivity has continued to the very present hour in which we live. While a few Jewish people returned from Babylon at the end of the 70-year period of captivity, because of sin and disobedience God continued to disperse and scatter Israel among the nations of the world.

The other empires that God told Daniel about also came upon the scene of history. These empires continued to bring judgment and chastisement upon Israel until ultimately God will bring judgment upon the Gentile nations for a period of seven years, which we call the Tribulation.

I believe that through this third encounter with the God of Israel, Nebuchadnezzar finally became a believer. He states, "Now I, Nebuchadnezzar, praise and exalt and glorify the King of Heaven, because everything he does is right and all his ways are just." (Dan. 4:37).

When the Tribulation Period is complete, after the seven years, God will then judge the nations and establish His Kingdom here upon the earth.

What God allowed Nebuchadnezzar to go through seemingly typifies and symbolizes what will actually happen during the times of the Gentiles.

First, we see the pride of these nations as they feel, in their sovereignty, in their power, in their places of privilege, that they have the right to do exactly as they please, with total disregard for God and for His Word, as well as for the people of Israel (Rom. 9–11).

The Tribulation

Second, God's Word tells us that during this period called the Tribulation God will pour out His wrath upon the Gentile nations. Interestingly, like Nebuchadnezzar and like Israel, He will not completely destroy the nations. As the stump in Nebuchadnezzar's dream remained in the ground, reminding him that his king-

dom would be restored, so some of the Gentile nations will survive and will go into the millennial kingdom of our Lord.

Even as God has preserved a remnant in Israel unto whom the King will return, so also it appears that God has reserved unto Himself a remnant from the Gentile nations who likewise will profess faith in Him. In that Kingdom Age, Jew and Gentile alike will worship the Lord, the God of Heaven.


When Nebuchadnezzar died he was succeeded by his son, Evil-Merodach (2 Ki. 25:27; Jer. 52:31). This was during the thirty-seventh year of the exile of Jehoiachin, king of Judah. Evil-Merodach reigned for only two years and was murdered by his brother-in-law, Neriglissar, who seized the throne. Violence begets violence. Terror begets terror. The light of God which had begun to shine in the life of King Nebuchadnezzar was gradually being dimmed by the evil deeds of these reigning kings.

Neriglissar was succeeded by his son, Labashi-Marduk, who reigned for less than a year when he was violently put to death by a group of conspirators led by a native Babylonian named Nabonidus. Nabonidus then established a coregency with his son, Belshazzar, whom we meet in Daniel, chapter 5. Nabonidus tried unsuccessfully to change the gods that the Babylonians worshiped to the moon god.

Thus the light that had been established in Nebuchad nezzar's court through the prophet Daniel and then through the king himself, who had experienced faith in God, gradually weakened and waned and was flickering out with the reign of Nabonidus and Belshazzar. These kings failed to heed God's Word. They failed to listen, not only to the words of Daniel, but to the words of King Nebuchadnezzar.

Leaders Held Accountable

Nations, like individuals, are responsible for the amount of light they have received in relationship to God's revealed Truth. ost Americans can't remember their first Christmas. I can. I was twenty-six years old when I first celebrated the event.

But so far as I was concerned, the Christmas story — the story of the birth of Christ — was just a story, a fairy tale. No substance. Lots of fun, but nothing more. Kind of like Cinderella — a neat story, but don't base your life on it. I wasn't even sure there had been a historical Jesus.

"I know very well how foolish it sounds to those who are lost, when they hear that Jesus died to save them" (I Corinthians 1:18a, TLB). Paul's words were certainly true of me. Apply a fairy tale to my life? That would be true foolishness.

Because I participated in the outward celebration of Christmas, people thought I knew what it was all about. Because I was an honor student in school, they couldn't imagine my being in ignorance on a subject they thought was common knowledge. But I was. Few who have been raised in a Christian home fully realize the extent of ignorance of basic Christianity of those who are not believers.

For the first twenty-six years of Bette's life, Christmas was only a fairy tale.

I thank God for Ken, the man who saw through my facade and realized the emptiness in my life. He explained salvation to me. It was the first time I had heard the message. I confessed my sins to God, repented, and accepted Christ. I was born again and baptized. "But we who are saved recognize this message as the very power of God" (1 Corinthians 1:18b, TLB).

The Christmas carols spoke to me that year as they never had. They were not just myths and fables set to pretty music. They contained eternal truth and significant history.

"Round yon virgin mother and child...." Yes! It's all true!

"It is the night of the dear Savior's birth." Yes, and now He is my Savior!

I had always enjoyed crafts and homemade gifts, so I decided to make my own Christmas cards to celebrate my new birth as well as His. I designed a card telling everyone I had been born again and was rejoicing in the Resurrection. I printed it on blue paper, a good color for Hanukkah. Kind friends chuckled when they received my cards and many months later told me resurrection themes were for Easter.

As I happily made gifts and decorations and put up my first very own Christmas tree, I rejoiced at the meaning Christmas now held for me. Jesus had been born in my life that year, and I felt that the whole creation was celebrating His birth.
